George is credited with being the progenitor of the Hayworth/Haworth family in America. In 1699 he boarded the Brittania in Liverpool, England and sailed to Pennsylvania with William Penn on his second voyage from England to America.

After George married, he moved to upper Buckingham township in Bucks county. Some reports say he and his family lived near Lahaska Station in Solebury township; other reports say Cottage Hill in Buckingham township. He made his living as a linen weaver and as a farmer. Obviously, George and his family were Quakers. He and Sarah were members of the Falls Monthly Meeting of Friends in Buckingham township. Their children were members of the Buckingham Monthly Meeting of Friends in Bucks county.

Tradition states George died from working too hard to build a new life for his family. The date he signed his will (November 28, 1724) is frequently given as his date of death. The record states "27th day of 11th month called Janiwary in the year of our Lord 1724/5" (Quaker dating system). The will was proved June 6, 1725.
